Population: approximately 300,000; Home of University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Nebraska Wesleyan, Union College, Southeast Community College and several private vocational-technical schools.

The District

The Lincoln Public School District includes 39 elementary schools, 12 middle schools, 6 high schools, one alternative school, a Career Academy School and two specialty focus high school programs. The district serves nearly 43,000 students, employs approximately 3,500 teachers and has a total of over 5,000 employees.

Lincoln East High School

Serves approximately 2400 students with a faculty of 170 and support staff of 100. Approximately 14% of the population qualifies for Special Education Services; 25% qualify for the Free and Reduced lunch program.

Co-Curricular Programs

Lincoln East High School is committed to the education of the whole student. Opportunities include the performing arts, athletics, speech, debate, and a variety of student interest clubs. These opportunities that extend beyond the school day play a significant role in providing students with the enriching experiences that support our educational mission.

Co-Curricular Programs

East High School students have been State Speech Champions 33 times and Runners-up 8 times in the past 43 years. In 2016 & 2018 East High was recognized as a Speech School of Excellence from the National Speech and Debate Association, an award given to teams that rank among the Top 20 teams at that National Tournament.

The Lincoln East Debate and Congress team has finished runner-up at the State Competition the last 4 years and won both the policy and congress state championships in 2018. At the national level, the debate team has placed students among the top in the nation with students making semifinals at the national tournament the last 2 years and qualifying a district record 3 teams to the Tournament of Champions in 2019. East High School students have been state “We the People” Congressional Hearing Champions for 13 of the last 15 years.

Athletics

Lincoln East offers nineteen sports sanctioned by the Nebraska Schools Activities Association. Many of these sports have freshman, reserve and/or junior varsity levels as well as varsity teams. Since East High opened in 1967, the Spartan athletic teams have earned state championships 73 times in 14 different sports. In the Fall of 2018 the Girls Cross Country brought home the most recent state title. Lincoln East is a member of the Heartland Athletic Conference and competes in Class A (the state's largest schools), providing an elite level of competition for our athletes.

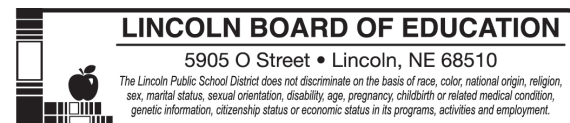

Graduation Requirements

Students are required to complete 245 credit hours. Lincoln East High School is organized into a semester system with seven, forty-eight-minute periods per day plus a lunch period. Students may earn 5 credits for a semester class. Double period classes and compacted classes can earn 10 credits per semester.

Effective for the class of 2021, the Laude Latin model will be used to recognize academic excellence at the conclusion of a student's high school career. Students will work to compete against the criterion for academic honors - rather than other students. A student's final cumulative GPA will be used to determine the level of honor on a student's high school transcript, diploma, and for academic recognition at commencement exercises. The following three levels of academic honors will be used:

1. Summa Cum Laude - "with highest distinction": Students with cumulative GPA of 4.250 and above on a 4.00 weighted scale.
2. Magna Cum Laude - "with great distinction": Students with cumulative GPA of 4.000 to 4.249 on a 4.00 weighted scale.
3. Cum Laude - "with distinction": Students with cumulative GPA of 3.750 to 3.999 on a 4.00 weighted scale.

Comprehensive Curriculum

Lincoln East High School offers courses in 13 subject areas, including: a wide range of Differentiated, AP, and Honors Academy classes many with college credit potential. Special Education, Gifted Student, and Work Experience programs are available for students as well as a wide variety of offerings to meet individual student interests and needs across a broad range of abilities, and post-high school aspirations.

East High School offers selections in AP or Differentiated (Honors) classes throughout the curriculum. Students are encouraged to take the most challenging courses they are capable of taking. A list of weighted courses can be found below.
